In the past year, PSS has been proactive in reestablishing our connections with the National University of Singapore (NUS) Pharmaceutical Society, Department of Pharmacy, NUS and the Health Sciences Authority. At the same time, reaching out to engage with new external stakeholders such as the Singapore Association of Pharmaceutical Industries (SAPI) and the various pharmaceutical companies. PSS will also look for suitable opportunities for our members to share their expertise at regional and international platforms and to network with fellow pharmacists. For example, we nominated our members who could provide their expertise in roundtable discussions organized by the International Pharmaceutical Federation (FIP). We also nominated a speaker to share on "Digitalization and Leadership in the Community Pharmacy: A Singapore Perspective" in the Bali Pharmacy Festival that was organized by the Ikatan Apoteker Indonesia (IAI) Pengurus Daerah Bali, a regional chapter of the Indonesian Pharmacists Association. I was also honoured to be invited to speak at the ACCP Global Conference on Clinical Pharmacy 2022 on "Digital Transformation of Clinical Pharmacy Services in Singapore".

As for professional education sessions, we are continuing with the online Zoom platforms for evening CPEs. Our community chapter is currently reviewing the PSS Guidelines for Telepharmacy and Tele-Pharmaceutical Care Services and will continue to make the modules of the Practice Guide for Minor Ailments (PGMA) available on our website. To support our pharmacy ancillary staff, I am pleased to inform that in July 2022, PSS rolled out the revamped WSQ Advanced Certificate in Healthcare (Pharmacy Support) and we had conducted 2 cohort runs in 2022. PSS also collaborated with the Singapore General Hospital and clinched the InnovPlus Grant to curate training for healthcare professionals.

In the coming year, PSS will continue to focus on strengthening our Secretariat, provide valuable resources for members' growth, and improve our engagement with members and better establish what matters to them. We will continue with the plan to revamp our PSS website which had met with some roadblocks and a workgroup will be set up to oversee this. We aim to upgrade our website to better serve the needs of our members and respective stakeholders, hopefully within the next year.

Last but not least, I would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone who had supported me in my one-year journey as PSS President. Navigating out of the COVID-19 pandemic and negative fiscal year 2021, we threaded carefully on our accounts in year 2022. With everyone's combined efforts, I am glad to inform that we ended the year with a surplus of \$55,323.25.

Financial Condition of the Association

With the surplus, we are able to transfer 80% of this amount to our building fund. After addition, our building fund stands at \$1,588,906, with \$1 million invested in fixed deposits. Although expenses grew 24% vs last year, we grew our income even more, at 69% more than FY2021.

Income Drivers

PSS's top income drivers came from membership subscriptions, seminars & courses, and Pharmacy Congress. The greatest increase was from seminars & courses, mainly driven by our 37th CPTC run. "I am glad to inform that we ended the year with a surplus of \$55,323.25"

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


Figure 1: FY2022 Income contributions

The society's top expenditures came from secretariat manpower, seminars & courses, memberships written off and office rental. Comparing FY2022 against FY2021, the main difference in the expenditure model was attributed a respective increase in expenses of seminars & courses.




Figure 2: Expenditure contributions



The PSS Retreat 2022 took place on 29th October, Saturday, at the Centre for Healthcare Innovation. Organized by the PSS 116th Council, the event was attended by the Chief Pharmacist of the Ministry of Health, Dr Camilla Wong, current and future pharmacy leaders from various sectors, and young PSS volunteer pharmacists. The aim of the retreat was to discuss strategic directions and plans for the society in the next 3 years (2023–2025).


The session was kickstarted by PSS President, Dr Vivianne Shih, who gave the welcome address, followed by Dr Camilla's talk titled Riding on the Forces of Change, which gave participants a brief overview on the National Pharmacy Strategy, the integration of Pharmacy services into the Healthier SG strategy, and also PHARMFORCE. It was established that PSS would be a key partner in achieving the goals of the PHARMAFORCE initiative.

The participants were then split into smaller groups to discuss the following topics:

- · Voice of the Profession
- · Healthier SG
- PSS Membership

The general consensus was that stakeholder buy-in is critical to achieve these goals. These stakeholders include both internal pharmacy clients at all levels of the profession and external audience including the patient population, industry partners and government bodies. The Pharmacy Leadership would need to set the short and long term strategic directions, communicating and aligning with the pharmacy community, so as to deepen our value proposition to our external customers. PSS would work to be the platform connecting all pharmacists towards a common goal.

WPPF is supportive of integration as long as existing capacity, services and viability are not compromised excessively.




Spring Clean into 2022 Campaign: #DeclutterYourMeds

Successful Hybrid Pharmacy Week 2022


Pharmacy Week 2022 Organising Committee





Pharmacy Week took place from 19th to 25th September 2022 with a health carnival held on 24th September at the Nee Soon East Seniors' Hub. The theme was "Empowering A Healthier You", emphasising on the importance of a holistic health ownership encompassing medications, fitness and diet in alignment with the Ministry of Health's population health strategy, HealthierSG.

In addition to the health talks, an inaugural cooking demonstration and fitness workout were held that attracted more than 600 members of the public. There were also interactive booths that kept the public engaged and empowered on health information. To increase reach, the carnival was streamed online and garnered 200 virtual participants.







Fringe activities such as the "Ask Your Pharmacist" programme, multi-disciplinary project features, pharmacist video features, "Pharm Fact Friday" series were organised to keep the public engaged for the lead up towards Pharmacy Week. 
Supporting our Pharmacists

Hospital Chapter

In August 2022, Hospital Chapter collaborated with the Infectious Diseases Special Interest Group (IDSIG) to create a pocket guide to support pharmacists in recommending COVID-19 vaccinations and caring for patients with COVID-19. This COVID-19 therapeutics guide serves to provide updated information on the vaccines, antiviral therapies, immunomodulators and viral-neutralizing, antibody-based therapies. Moving forward, Hospital Chapter would be focusing on the digitalization of healthcare, care models and population health topics in our future guides.

In a bid to encourage continual improvement in our work processes and to spark innovative ideas, the hospital chapter actively gathers best practices from the various hospitals in Singapore. In June 2022, a project from the inpatient pharmacy of KK Women's and Children's Hospital (KKH), titled "Auto-intervention by Pharmacy and its impact on the Time Spent on processing Discharge Medications" was shared. This project was a huge success as it helped to save a median processing time of 24 minutes/prescription. This translated into \$74,800 man-hour cost savings for pharmacists. We hope to continue the sharing of impactful projects to bring pharmacy practice to greater heights.





Supporting Best Practice During COVID-19 Pandemic

Hospital Chapter

During the COVID-19 pandemic, Hospital Chapter featured pharmacists' involvement in overcoming the crisis, highlighting initiatives which included the setting up of community care facilities and teleconsultation services. As Singapore transited towards being endemic with COVID-19, Hospital Chapter continue its efforts to educate the public on related topics to support the public as they learn to live with COVID-19.

An e-bulletin was published in June 2022 that featured various oral antiviral drugs available via prescription, vaccination options, recommendations for booster vaccinations and medications for management to aid with COVID-19 symptoms.

The quick summary was useful for the general public to understand the indications and common side effects of the medications, and also promoted the use of other relevant vaccinations such as influenza and pneumococcal vaccines as a primary prevention to other respiratory illnesses.

31st Singapore Pharmacy Congress 2022

The 31st Singapore Pharmacy Congress (SPC) 2022 was a much awaited event, bringing together pharmacists from all backgrounds, both in-person and online, in its first hybrid format. Three years since the last in-person SPC at the Suntec Convention and Exhibition Centre, the theme of "Emerging Healthcare in a Brave New World!" drew in nearly 800 participants and 80 abstract submissions from across the country. The theme aligned with the Ministry of Health's Healthier SG initiative, highlighting the vital role of pharmacy in transforming healthcare, emerging in crisis situations, and working towards better health outcomes.

Dr Janil Puthucheary, Senior Minister of State, Ministry of Health and Ministry of Communications and Information, as the Guest of Honour opened the Congress in a powerful symbol of unity by scanning the "31st SPC Check-In" QR codes together with Dr Camilla Wong, Chief Pharmacist, Dr Vivianne Shih, President of 116th PSS Council, and Ms Vivian Chin and Ms Yvonne Ng, 31st SPC Co-Chairpersons. Dr Prem Kumar Nair, the keynote speaker, shared his insights on value-based healthcare and transformation. The two-day program covered a range of topics, including supply chain resiliency, shifts in care delivery, emerging trends, and the future of the pharmacy profession through technological innovation.

Pre-Registration Pharmacists' Training Committee

The PSS Pre-Registration Pharmacists' Training Committee comprises of a team of dedicated preceptors from 18 Singapore Pharmacy Council (SPC) - approved training centres in Singapore. The committee has been working closely with SPC to plan, co-ordinate, review and conduct this training programme for our pre-registration pharmacists.

The opening ceremony was held online on 25th June 2022 and a total of 158 pre-registration pharmacists were enrolled into this programme. Between June to December 2022, a total of 11 lectures were conducted. The topics covered a comprehensive range, that included paediatrics geriatrics, renal medicine and travel medications. Feedback received were generally positive, and pre-registration pharmacists found the sessions beneficial. With the easing of the COVID-19 restrictions, the Closing Ceremony was held physically on 10th December at the Yong Loo Lin School of Medicine, Tahir Foundation Building, MD1 Lecture Theatre 37.

PSS would also like to sincerely thank all our preceptors for facilitating the lecture programme and to express our deepest appreciation to the speakers, for sharing their knowledge and expertise, and taking time off their busy schedule to speak at these sessions and to share their expertise with our pre-registration pharmacists.


Staying Clinically Relevant

Community Chapter

The PSS Practice Guide for Minor Ailments (PGMA) is a compendium of guidelines across 14 frequently encountered minor ailments. The key objective is to standardise practice across institutions and enhance the delivery of pharmaceutical care to patients and consumers in the primary sector. The modules are available on the PSS website and are provided complimentary for all PSS members. Upon completion of each module, 2 CPE points and a certificate of completion will be awarded.

To keep abreast with the latest standards of practice, the PGMA compendium underwent a series of extensive reviews last year. In 2022, the Community Chapter spearheaded the revision of 6 topics, completed the revision cycle, and commissioned the introduction of 3 new topics, such as Foot Care, Oral Health, and Insomnia. Collectively, these serve as a comprehensive and updated guide to clinical practice, with new literature and evidence supporting the models of care.

Members who have completed the previous version of the modules are highly encouraged to revisit these topics to update themselves with the latest standards of practice and earn CPE points. Members can look out for these updates in quarter 1 of 2023.



Additionally, she has been invited to share her wealth of knowledge at various workshops and conferences. She has also organised a variety of health promotion events to increase the awareness of exercise in the prevention of cardiovascular diseases.




Continuing Pharmacy Education

Professional Chapter

As part of the Professional Education Chapter's mission to organise comprehensive Continuing Pharmacy Education and training programmes for Pharmacists in Singapore, a total of 10 pharmacist-lead Continuing Education talks on a diverse range of topics were organised in FY22, epilepsy in children, ADHD in children and adolescents, SLE, asthma in Covid-10 endemic world, critical care, HFpEF, role of pharmacist in Healthier SG, ethics in pharmacy and social prescribing.

Similar to 2021, the CE talks continued to be held virtually and were well-received by members citing the convenience of attending the CEs on the go without having to run to the venue of the CEs.



CPE Session: Updates on oral antiviral use for management of COVID-19

Infectious Disease Special Interest Group (IDSIG)

In collaboration with the Hospital chapter, IDSIG organised a CPE session which provided updates on the use of oral antivirals for the management of COVID-19. With the rolling out of oral antiviral therapy in the community setting, this session provided participants with an overview of the pharmacotherapy for COVID-19 and also discussed the considerations regarding its use for the management of COVID-19.

The talk was presented by the speaker, Ms Law Hwa Lin, the Unit Head of NCID Pharmacy and was attended by 311 pharmacists on the ZOOM platform.





Roadmap for Providing Vaccination Services in the Community Settings

Community Chapter

The Community Chapter had the privilege of collaborating closely with the Ministry of Health, Chief Pharmacist's Office (CPO) in the development of Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs) for the Community Vaccination Programme sandbox. As subject matter experts, the Chapter contributed to the drafting of end-to-end process map and comprehensive guidance on the proper controls for the provision of effective and safe vaccinations in the community setting, such as retail pharmacies.

These SOPs provide detailed references for the vaccination processes, such as the receiving, storage, and handling of vaccines, screening of patients, preparation, and administration of vaccination, and adverse drug reactions and anaphylaxis management. Therefore, they will lay the foundations for enabling a more seamless launch of the programme in the future.







Collaborating with HSA in MedSafety Week

Public Education Chapter

The PSS Public Education Chapter supported the Health Science Authority's (HSA) and participated in this year's MedSafetyWeek, an international annual campaign organised by Uppsala Monitoring Centre of World Health Organization. From 7 to 13 November, the PSS Public Education Chapter has supported HSA in the MedSafetyWeek by publicising 2 animation clips to promote the intended messages on our social media platform.

This annual campaign aims to encourage reporting of side effects and increase awareness of national pharmacovigilance systems. The theme of 2022 was "How patients and healthcare professionals make safety work" and promotes the importance role of reporting suspected side effects in identifying emerging safety issues and prompting protective actions.

YPC Sandbox

Young Pharmacists Chapter (YPC)

The YPC Sandbox was launched nationwide in 2022 to encourage innovation and collaboration in pharmacy. It provided a platform where pharmacists can express and realise innovative ideas, , with provision of resources and network with relevant expertise by PSS to pilot the projects. The committee explored how the community pharmacy can bring sustainable development in terms of, but not limited to, environment, economic and social aspects through the theme 'Sustainable Pharmacy in Singapore'. The competition was awarded to the "Green Doctors Programme" which aims to create a sustainable ecosystem for recycling medication blister packaging, with a vision to minimise the environmental impact of pharmaceutical activities.

YPConnect

Young Pharmacists Chapter (YPC)

YPConnect is an initiative to foster stronger cooperative ties between PSS and the NUS Pharmaceutical Society (NUSPS), First introduced in 2020, YPConnect aims to engage pharmacy students in more PSS-organized events and vice versa, as well as for young pharmacists to share their experience with aspiring pharmacy students to have an insider view of a pharmacist's or pharmacy graduate's day-to-day work.

As of 2022, YPConnect has completed its second run with a total of 15 pharmacists and 23 pharmacy students. Each run features introductory sessions for the pharmacist befrienders and students to get to know one another. The students then select whom they prefer to be partnered with, and the pharmacist befrienders are then matched to the students based on the students' interests. Subsequent interactions are kept free and easy, and last for at least 1 year.

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
Improving Social Media Outreach

Invitation to Speak at 2022 ACCP Global Conference on Clinical Pharmacy

The 2022 ACCP Global Conference on Clinical Pharmacy was held from Oct 15 through 18 at the Hilton San Francisco Union Square, USA. This was a physical conference that was much awaited after 3 years. I was humbled to be given the opportunity to represent Singapore to speak at this international conference, my first in the capacity as President, 116th Council PSS.

I spoke on the "Digital Transformation of Clinical Pharmacy Services in Singapore" in the symposium track "Advances in Clinical Pharmacy Practice Around the World". This track was crafted to provide conference delegates with updates on the status of clinical pharmacy practice and practice innovations in the Middle East (UAE) and Asia. There were 2 other speakers namely Assoc Prof Bassam Atallah who spoke on the clinical pharmacy practice at Cleveland Clinic in Abu Dhabi and Assoc Prof Lin Shu-Wen who spoke on the monitoring of antifungal therapy in Taiwan. The session was moderated by Prof Jerry L Bauman, Dean Emeritus and Distinguished Professor Emeritus, University of Illinois at Chicago College of Pharmacy, Chicago, Illinois. The conference provided an excellent platform for us to share how clinical pharmacy practice had progressed and training required for the provision of the clinical pharmacy services in our respective countries. There were also 3 additional symposium tracks added in view that this was a global ACCP conference: (1) Clinical Pharmacy Education and Training: Global Perspectives, (2) Global Community Clinical Pharmacy Practice and (3) Global Clinical Pharmacy Innovations.

At the conference, there was a separate international delegate reception held where pharmacists could relax, network and explore potential collaborations to advance clinical pharmacy practice.

For pharmacists who wish to connect with focused groups of clinical pharmacists to enhance professional support and collaboration, they could attend the numerous ACCP Practice and Research Networks (PRNs) events held during the conference.

This was a fulfilling conference. Besides being updated on the latest in pharmacotherapy, it was also nourishing for the heart – to be able to meet like-minded passionate pharmacists from around the world and to establish long-lasting friendships and network.

He was one of the foreign speakers invited to speak at the seminar portion of the event held at The Stones Hotel in Bali, Indonesia. Bali Pharmacy Festival is an event organized by the Ikatan Apoteker Indonesia (IAI) Pengurus Daerah Bali, which is a regional chapter of the Indonesian Pharmacists Association. This year, the theme was 'Smart Pharmacist and Leadership in Digitalisation'. The seminar was attended by more than 300 participants.

During the seminar, Mr Rosales spoke about 'Digitalisation & Leadership in the Community Pharmacy: A Singapore Perspective', sharing on the various digitalization efforts in community pharmacy practice in Singapore and how pharmacy leadership plays a vital role in initiating, managing and sustaining such efforts.
